Village Hall

It seems along time since we first talked in committee, about replacing our ageing heating unit and also the front doors. The question of approaching the National Lottery Charities Board for a grant was discussed. The grant would be to update the heating system, replace the front doors, but more important to make the hall user friendly for people in wheelchairs. This would be to provide a ramp and toilet facilities. Facilities that are a must in public buildings today. Many hours went into form filling by the committee also our independent referee, Miss Rita Nicholls. The outcome as you know was an award of £12,500. The cost of the

building work was £16,000, this does not include the heating system or the architect's fee. We did apply for additional funding from other sources, unfortunately without success. The additional money then being taken from our National savings account. The work is now finished, carried out to a very high standard by Mr F. Hunt, Builder, of Elloughton Tel: 01482 668201.1 hope you agree with the Chairman and committee, that the completed work enhances the appearance of the hall, but more important it is now accessible to everyone. The ramp and conversion to one of the toilets might look as if we have gone over the top. The plans were drawn up by the architect, passed by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council planning department, also by the NLCB as being the current regulations for this type of facility. We hope that whilst the building work was in progress that it was not to inconvenient for you, if you did experience any difficulty, we can only apologise. The date to commence building was not something that we could control. We are now as I write in the process of painting the entrance hall and toilets, when we are finished with the decorating we shall have an official opening, (date to be announced later.) We look forward to your continued support, now satisfied that access is available to all, whatever age or level of fitness. Finally, don't forget that Mrs Jessie Puckering will be pleased to take your booking for your children's party, family gathering, wedding reception, etc.

Parish Council

Police update - Chief Inspector Steven Tipple explained the current structure and the way funding is likely to affect staffing levels, he expected cuts would mainly affect middle management. The Surgery at South Cave Town Hall is very poorly attended. The modernisation of the radio system is likely to be very expensive - but essential. The Council asked for his support in their repeated requests for a lower speed limit in the village and he agreed to pursue the matter.

Caravans - Change of use at Waudby's Caravans requested by Wandahome; to become Caravan Sales. There is concern at the way the change may affect this site, especially with its proximity to the dangerous junction.

Bus Shelter & Noticeboard - A Bus Shelter has

been requested for a site at, or close to, Hilltop and it is being considered in conjunction with the request for a 2nd Parish Council Noticeboard (in addition to the •



one on the Village Hall). If permission for erection is given by East Riding of Yorkshire Council Highways, a meeting will be arranged with local residents.

Litter Bin - Like Dr. Who's Tardis, a new bin had suddenly appeared on the Green. This had apparently been requested by an anonymous person a year earlier and East Riding of Yorkshire Council decided that it was justified. We await to see if the bin requested for Ringbeck crossroads appears in a similar fashion.

Kingston Communications work - There was some consternation at the way work had started without any consultation with the Parish Council. KC representatives had been invited to attend a Parish Council meeting but they had declined at the last minute. An ugly grey pipe had been placed across the beck in a prominent position; a letter from the Parish expressing their unease had been sent to KC. The grey pipe was subsequently removed.

Cave Lane Footpath - A site visit was held with Mr. Lister of East Riding of Yorkshire Council. With a number of villagers he toured this and other areas of the village which are considered to have problems. His responses were not very encouraging.

Many thanks to people in the village who had written to the Parish Clerk about the former existence of the Cave Lane footpath, 13 letters had been received.

Parish Paths Partnership - A report had been produced by Tim Pickles. This recorded the current state of the 5 Definitive footpaths in the Parish and made suggestions as to how they could be improved and maintained. A site visit by the East Riding Parish Paths Officer has taken place and the recommendations have been approved in principle. Costs for the work will be obtained for East Riding of Yorkshire Council to approve and pay when the work is done.

Humber Flood Bank - This is to be raised by about 600mm and will necessitate the widening of the base. The Council have asked that the widening be carried out on the side nearest the river so that the pasture land nearest the railway is not diminished and so that as many as possible of the mature Hawthorn trees can be preserved.

Planning - All households in the village should now have received a circular about Ellerker's Conservation status. There is an application for change of use for Waudby's Caravans (see above). Woodale Farm's new garage: questions were raised about the building materials to be used and the fire escape. Willow Garth: request to fell Willow trees close to buildings.

Neighbourhood Watch - The Chairman, Mrs Lynn Waddingham, was congratulated on the Ellerker Neighbourhood Watch Group receiving a national award.

Playing Fields

The Playing Field Millennium year activities started with the Children's Christmas Party on 8th January. Thirty children attended and after tea and a special visit by Father Christmas, en-

joyed musical chairs, musical bumps and spontaneous games organised by Paddy Hall.

In the autumn of 1999, we received a report from RoSPA concerning the state of the play



equipment on the smaller playing field and although, with some minor expenditure, most of the facilities came up to the minimum standard, we were strongly encouraged to provide some protective surfacing underneath the swings, the see-saw and the turning bars

On 2nd February, the Committee visited Askham Bryan College near York, to see the very wide range of playground equipment available. There was an equally wide range of absorbent surfaces to see in situ, which made them much easier to evaluate. As a result of this visit and subsequent meetings, outline plans have been drawn up and quotations obtained to update the facilities on the playing field We are particularly mindful of the conflicting interests of providing suitable and attractive equipment for the children of the village to use and enjoy and the residents looking on to the Greens, the debate concerning moving the goal posts from the small field to the larger field being a case in point

The committee hope to be able to show their preferred plans and other options at an open meeting to be held, either at or prior to the AGM on Wednesday, 17 April at 7 30pm. We hope that as many residents as possible will be able to attend the meeting to give their views, particularly those whose properties front onto the Playing Fields and all those living in the village with young children

The cost of providing a recommended protective surface is high, for example it would amount to approximately 50% of the cost of installing a new set of swings The much cheaper alternatives of shavings or bark are also being considered, but we have been advised that foxes and cats find them very attractive places to do their business and they are only a temporary solution as they have to be constantly replenished.

The Playing Field Committee's main source of income to maintain the two fields. The Annual Barn dance will be held on Friday, 23rd June 2000 at White House Farm, the White Horse Ceilidh Band has already been booked, so please make a note of the date.

All the trees are now in the ground and ready to re-start their growing. This was a mammoth task, with 210 trees to plant, and there are many people to thank. To Suzy Healey who provided stakes and guards for the trees. Trees were also provided for their own planting to: Chris Bradley, Angela Puckering, Suzy Healey and Julie Blanchard. At Blanchard's Stables the Horse Chestnut trees grown by the village children have been planted, these will eventually grow to a size where they can provide shade for the horses. The Horse Chestnut which won the children's competition, grown by Zed Richards, has been planted down Sands Lane. The varieties of trees planted in Sands Lane and beyond Sands Bridge are Oak, Ash, Sycamore, Mountain Ash and Alder. Those planted down Ings Lane are Silver Birch, Ash, Beech, Sycamore, Mountain Ash and Alder.

The trees were purchased from funds raised by the Millenium Group and a number were donated by Greens Garden Centre, the weed mats



at the base of each tree were given by Mark Green. Thanks to all who participated in any way with the planting. At the moment the trees may be hardly noticeable, but in 20 years time they will be a real feature of the village.
