Rosalie and Ivor

Hi again from Rosalie and Ivor, this time from Tasmania where we have been back happily for two weeks!

We had a false departure from Wirrina on Tuesday 24 May. We started out in the evening, planning to reach Robe in 24 hours. Fortunately we had some head wind so kept the motor going, and half an hour later noticed that the engine alternators were not charging the batteries. Also what had been a very slight leak from the injector pump was now dripping diesel at a drip per second. So we turned back and berthed again at Wirrina an hour later.

By the following Sunday we had two new alternators and (an easy!) replacement piece on the injector pump and all was well. We also chatted with David and his wife from Victor Harbor berthed next to us on Olive 2. David was a former fisherman and advised us to go through Backstairs Passage (between South Australia mainland and Kangaroo Island) on the outgoing tide as the tide race can be considerable.

We left on Monday 30 May at 6 am, before dawn, and had a pleasant sail down the coast, past Cape Jervis, into Backstairs Passage and past Antechamber Bay on Kangaroo Island and then The Pages, a group of rocky outcrops in the Passage. Near Cape Jervis we passed a feeding frenzy of gulls and dolphins madly fishing, there were also quite a number of fishing boats that morning.

We used motor and sail all day with land gradually fading from sight as we moved further into Encounter Bay. A head wind came up during the night, so we just motored on slowly through a fairly choppy sea and finally came into Robe late on Tuesday. We were pretty tired and a little damp as there had been a few showers, and glad of the calm berth in the canal near the lagoon where the Cray boats moor. Thankfully, the crayfish season had only just ended and we did not have to worry about dodging lines of buoys. Wednesday was a rest day, pleasantly spent in Robe where we also caught up with Geoff Nicolson who had helped us find fuel etc on our way to Wirrina last November. An 8 am getaway onThursday morning, fine and sunny, but very little wind so the sails were much less help than the engine. It was a pleasant trip down the south coast, identifying landmarks on the way, and actually with mobile telephone reception much of the way. *To be continued*
