Incidents

Only one serious incident has been reported in the last three months and that was the theft of a trailer from Chris Bradley's barn. There has been a further attempted break in at the same premises but nothing was stolen.

Owners of buildings housing high value equipment might like to consider installing closed circuit television with data recording, this has come down in price considerably over the past few years.

It is essential that residents report any criminal activity, no matter how trivial, to the police as the number of reported incidents is one of the main criteria that the police use in determining the required amount of police presence in an area.

Speed Limit

We have had a number of complaints from residents about the lack of a speed limit in the village. This is a matter for the Parish Council not Neighbourhood Watch but for your information the current situation is as follows:-

The speed limit in the village is currently 60mph.

The government's policy is that all villages should have a speed limit of 30mph and, in certain cases some stretches of road may be limited to 20mph.

Regulations then differ according to whether or not the road is lit.

Roads with street lighting

If the street lights are no more than 183m (200 yards) apart the road is automatically a 30 mph area unless signed differently

Roads without street lighting

After the initial 30mph sign there must be a repeater sign within 200m and then a repeater sign either every 400m if on the same side of the road or every 250m if on alternate sides.

Cars may not be parked without lights on roads in a 60mph zone.

Emergency Plan

The County Council recently held a seminar on Emergency Planning for Neighbourhood Watch Coordinators and Parish Councillors. We need to discuss this with our colleagues on the Parish Council particularly with

regard to flooding but in the meantime very useful information is available at http://www.environment-gency.gov.uk/homeandleisure/floods. Residents who do not have access to the internet should contact their coordinator for more information.
