Playing Fields

At the AGM in April, we said goodbye to Chairman, Bill Ettridge, past Chairman, Patricia Christmas and to Margaret Green, all of whom had decided not to seek re-election and we thanked them all for the valuable time and work they had given to the committee over the years. We welcomed Gill Lancaster and Heather Ohikere as new members of the committee.

The theme for 1999 will be to work more closely with other village groups, particularly in view of the anticipated additional activities which the Millennium celebrations will bring.

We also hope to put in place a financial plan which will ensure the future upkeep and maintenance of the two playing fields. Currently, a contractor cuts the bulk of the grass using a tractor with large mower attached and the perimeters of the two fields are cut by hand mower and strimmer on a rota system by volunteers. The committee members maintain the fields and play equipment in safe working order. Annually, we have to raise funds to pay for contract mowing and insurance, we hope that all Ellerker residents, who appreciate the attractiveness of this amenity in the heart of their village, will feel able to contribute.

Amongst other activities, the Committee organise the Childrens' Christmas party and the annual Sports Day on the Green and would

always welcome the help and support of parents in staging these traditional events.

Brown or Green?

In March of each year, before the grass mowing season starts and in order to hasten mowing operations, East Riding of Yorkshire Council arrange for the spraying of weedkiller around mowing obstacles such as telegraph poles, road signs and fences. This year they repeated what had been done the year before: several wide brown stains were left behind after they had finished their operation around the village. Despite them being asked not to spray on the Playing Fields and particularly on the daffodils which had been planted 2-3 years before, they went ahead and did so. It is particularly annoying when the areas which have been sterilised had before been carefully tended by villagers for the previous 20+ years. Last year by way of apology East Riding of Yorkshire Council donated a bag of daffodil bulbs to the Playing Field Committee and these replaced those which had been damaged by being sprayed and the remainder were planted in new positions. This year after I complained they promised two bags of daffodil bulbs as a form of compensation and assured me that the damage would not recur. We wait to see - we could end up without the offending brown stains - or stuffed to the gills with Daffs. - TJP

St. Anne's

The District PCC wish to thank everyone who supported the Brass Band Concert, The Quiz Night and the Jumble Sale, raising £1,000, £180 and £154 respectively for Church funds. With an 8% increase in Quota to £5,000 per annum, this ongoing help is greatly appreciated and absolutely necessary for us to meet our outgoings.

Kay and Frank Barratt would like to thank everyone who supported them with gifts, donations etc. to make the Coffee Morning held at Church House, Ellerker on Wednesday, 12th May, a great success, realising for the Hull and East Riding Institute for the Blind, £678 which makes a total of £4,888 over the past fourteen years.

Kay would particularly like to express her appreciation to Alan and Marlene Key who have hosted the event on several occasions in past years.

Richard Frith the Bishop of Hull will be visiting St. Anne's Church during the Millenium year, date to be confirmed. He opened the batting with David Caswell for the York Diocese v. the Wakefield Diocese on Thursday, 10th June at Whitely Bridge Cricket Ground. Bishop Richard scoring 65 runs and David 83 runs. Final result: York 237 for 5 and Wakefield 201 for 6 in this 40 over match. News reporter our resident Dickie Bird.

At a recent meeting of the District PCC I was shown a post card of St. Anne's Church taken from Howden Croft Hill. Unfortunately this view of the Church has now been blocked out by new development and evergreen trees and the District PCC are powerless to do anything about it. It seems we were not invited to attend an appeal meeting to enable the PCC's views to be heard in the 1970s. We are not however prepared to let this major hiccup stand in our way, our intention is to light up St. Anne's Church for the Millenium. To see St. Anne's Church from dusk to dawn is our objective. It is common practice in this Diocese for sponsors to contribute towards the lighting of their Parish Church for a day or a week, for whatever reason they wish to; this will be approximately £3 per week for St. Anne's Church. We intend to dig the trenches for the cables ourselves, so as to save money on the installation.

We are hoping that the Church footpaths in all three directions will become a public right of way so that the responsibility for maintenance will be taken by the East Riding of Yorkshire Council. Tree roots are making the surface of the footpath uneven at the present time so the cost could be substantial. It saddens me that St. Anne's Church has yet to become a Parish with it's own PCC and two Church Wardens, ie. like St. Mary's, Broomfleet, so that we can administer such changes as the status of this footpath ourselves. We are the only Parish in the Howden Deanery with a District PCC even though our Quota payment to York is greater than half the PCCs in the Deanery. When will we reach Ecclesiastical maturity? This matter is totally beyond my comprehension at the present time but I am attempting to improve my understanding of what seems to be a totally illogical situation, as all other Churches are members of a team sharing their Vicars with two or three Churches yet they have a PCC and two Church Wardens. St. Anne's is older than St. Mary's, Broomfleet so why are we in this situation? Perhaps the same powers that be got them the 30 mph speed restrictions before Ellerker. We love you all, no hard feelings just a minor correction please.

Parish Council

Election — As far as the Parish Council was concerned the Election on 6th May was a nonevent, since one member of the Council decided not to stand for re-election and one additional member was nominated making 7 in total, the number required to form a full Council. Mary Dennis, after 12 years active and valuable service, decided that it was time to re-

tire. She was the first woman member of the Parish Council and the only female Chairman to date.

AGM — The AGM and Annual Village Assembly was held on 11th

May, Chris Bradley was re-elected Chairman by a majority and Lynn Waddingham was elected vice-Chairman. Very few members of the public attended. Topics raised included: loose chippings on the road following re-surfacing, the imminent invasion of the road by the Blackthorn Hedge at Mill Hill (hilltop) junction, the dangerous state of the railings at Mill Hill - Main Street corner and air pollution from local glass house boilers

Planning — Applications for a new garage at Ashwood House, a garage and associated access at 16 Mill Hill, an extension at Woodale House and changes to the Village Hall were all approved by East Riding of Yorkshire Council. Permission for a small extension at Fern Villa was refused.

Footpaths — Concern has been expressed over the occasional obstruction of footpaths in the centre of the village, by vehicles being incorrectly parked and by shrubs and trees being allowed to grow out of control and overhang. This can present dangers, especially in poor light, to those who use footpaths rather than the road to move around the village.

Speed limit — it was decided that another attempt would be made to get a speed limit for the village, the last application was 3 years ago. Monitoring equipment has been installed on Howden Croft Hill and Cave Lane, this records volume and the speed of the vehicles passing over the rubber tubes which stretch across the width of the road. The greater the numbers the more likely that a limit will be introduced. All surrounding villages have a limit and through-village traffic volume has increased since the changes were made to the junction at the A63 South Cave Interchange.

Conservation Area — Conservation Area status for Ellerker was confirmed by a full East Riding of Yorkshire Council meeting in April - success at last after 15 to 20 years. Dennis Cooney will represent the Council at East Riding of Yorkshire Council area conservation meetings.

Litter bin — East Riding of Yorkshire Council have been asked to provide a litter bin at Ring Beck layby.

Black Horse — A meeting has been arranged between East Riding of Yorkshire Council Chief Planning Officer, the proprietors of the Black Horse Restaurant, a representative of the Parish Council and neighbours of the Black Horse. There is continuing concern among neighbours that noise and cooking smells from the Restaurant have led to a deterioration in their environment.

Notice board — A new Parish Council notice board has re-placed the damaged one on the Village Hall.

Next meetings — 29th June and 17th August.

On the 5th June 1999, a reconstructed Village water pump was erected on stonework opposite the Village Institute. The idea of reinstalling a Village pump was made to the millennium Committee by Mr. Frank Barratt. Mr. Cartwright-Taylor donated the basic pump 'works'. Mr. Jim Acey put these 'works' into new woodwork. Mr. John May provided the necessary ironwork. Mr. Dennis Cooney supplied the commemorative plaque. Parish Boundary Walk

You may be surprised at the size of the Parish of Ellerker, considering that the population is less than 350. The boundary runs from the A63 interchange across fields to the top of Brantingham Dale, back down the dale road to skirt Brantingham village, across to Whinneymoor Farm, traverses to Sands Lane/Sands Drain on to Brough Haven, along the Humber Bank to Crabley, follows the Clough and Sands Drain to join Norfolk Bank Lane at Bow Bridge, then up Norfolk Bank Lane and Stonepit Road to the Interchange. The shape of the Parish on the map is like a Hare on skis!

The boundary walk is one of the events arranged to mark the Millenium by the Ellerker and Hill-dales Millenium Group, the feasibility and planning for the walk have been undertaken by Nigel May (who first suggested the idea) and Tim Pickles.

This may be the only opportunity in your lifetime to walk the Parish boundary since special access permission has been obtained from landowners and tenants for this one-off event. The walk will take place on Saturday, 18th September 1999 starting at 9am outside the Village Hall. The northern half of the boundary will be completed by lunchtime and the walk will resume at 2pm to cover the southern half. The total distance is 13 miles and will require walkers to wear strong footwear and suitable clothes.

As well as being a very special event (as far as we know this has never been done before in living memory) it is intended to raise money for the Village Day being planned by the Group to take place next summer. Walkers may wish to find sponsors to raise their entry fee for the walk, which for adults is £5, for children (under 16yrs) £2 and for a family is £12. This fee is the mini-

mum to enter, if you wish raise more (or even much more!) sponsor forms will be available from Nigel, Tim or at Green's Garden Centre.

Due to the access arrangements walkers will only be able to take part if they are part of the official group. Check points will be arranged for the marking of sponsor sheets and two refreshment stations will be placed at strategic points on the route. Not only should this be a really enjoyable day out on your home-turf, it may surprise you just how large and varied is Ellerker Parish.
