#### St. Anne's

The Millennium became **real** on the 31<sup>st</sup> May 2000 when we celebrated Mary's awareness that she was pregnant, expecting Jesus on 25<sup>th</sup> December 0001. # **Danger - Toxocara Canis**

There is a very good reason why there are signs which ask dog owners not to let their pets go onto the Playing Fields - "Play Area No Dogs". Dog faeces can carry a disease which in extreme cases can cause blindness in children who ingest infected dog poo. Although it is very unlikely to happen, it really isn't worth the risk of causing such suffering to a person just starting their life. People may say that although their dog goes on the Fields, it doesn't foul them. But it only takes someone else's dog, someone who is a less responsible owner, perhaps someone from outside the village; to see that Ellerker people allow their dogs to "use" the Fields and the damage can be done. Please consider this before thinking of allowing your dog to play on the Fields.

In June Judi Merden from Radio Humberside was a lively speaker, telling of her progress from typist to presenter, after deciding to work in Hull after her University life there.

#### **Parish Council**

Bus Shelter. It has been agreed in principle that a bus shelter will be erected at Hill Top on the opposite side of the road to Croft Hill Cottage. The Parish Council will contribute £500 towards the cost and East Riding of Yorkshire Council will put in the hard standing between the shelter and the road.

**Dora's Bungalow.** An application has been made by the new owner, to demolish the bungalow, formerly the home of Dora Gardham. This was accompanied by a separate planning application for a new 2 storey dwelling.

#### Rubbish Dumping in the beck and on verges.

This has been discussed on a number of occasions by the Parish Council. Parishioners are respectfully reminded that rubbish should be disposed of in the proper way, either by composting within their own property boundary or by disposal through the services of East Riding of Yorkshire Council. Dumping garden waste on road verges is considered to be "fly tipping" and putting waste in the Beck is just transferring the problem to someone who lives downstream.

**Norfolk Bank Lane**. Concern has been expressed at the erosion caused by the turning of long vehicles on Norfolk Bank Lane.



**Chairman and Vice-Chairman.** Chris Bradley and Lynn Waddingham were re-elected as Chairman and Vice-Chairman at the Annual General Meeting on 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Seven members of the public attended the open meeting which preceded the AGM.

**Minutes on Notice Board.** A copy of the Minutes of each Parish Council Meeting are to be placed on the Parish Council Notice Board, once

they have been approved by Council members.

Shrubs overhanging footpaths. Shrubs and hedges have been growing rapidly in recent weeks and at several properties around the village they are overhanging the footpath. The Council asks that everyone checks their boundary adjacent to public footpaths and removes any encroaching vegetation.

Council Tax increase. A letter of protest had been sent to East Riding of Yorkshire Council at the high percentage increase in Council Tax (about 3 times the level of inflation). They responded by saying that they had to do so in order to maintain the level of services, particularly in Education.

**P3 agreement.** A Parish Paths Partnership agreement with East Riding of Yorkshire Council was signed and work has recently started, in improving signing, accessibility and maintenance of the five definitive footpaths within the Parish.

**Dog fouling.** This continues to be a nuisance in certain parts of the village and seems to stem from a small number of irresponsible owners.

**Speed Survey.** The results of the 2<sup>nd</sup> recent speed survey were forwarded to the Council by Humberside Police. One of our local East Riding of Yorkshire Council Councillors will be asked to support the Parish's claim for a lower speed limit in the village.

**Stonepit Road.** East Riding of Yorkshire Council has agreed to inform the Council about developments which are proposed at the former depot at Stonepit Road, in order that we may comment, as a neighbouring Parish, about any visual aspects which may affect us.

**Humber flood bank.** It seems almost certain that work to raise the Humber Bank adjacent to the Parish Boundary will not commence until 2001.

A major talking point amongst those involved in the Playing Field was the sudden and unexpected fall of a large branch from high up in the Horse Chestnut tree in the middle of the large field. It happened in the early afternoon of 15th May and went with a mighty crack which brought people out from their houses and gardens.

The branch which fell had been damaged at some time and had begun to show signs of rot. The weight of the branch when the tree was in full leaf had proved too great and it failed at the weakest point, where it had been damaged. Since then, the tree has been inspected by the Tree Officer from East Riding of Yorkshire Council in Beverley and two tree surgeons, who have pronounced it safe, but as a matter of precaution, all swings and ropes have been removed and will not be allowed in the future.

The Jumble sale in mid May raised £100 towards the cost of the Children's Christmas Party. Grateful thanks goes to those who provided a mound of jumble and particularly those who helped on the day sorting and selling. The balance of the jumble left was sent to Dove House Hospice in Hull, which they will re-sort, using the best for sale in their Charity Shops
