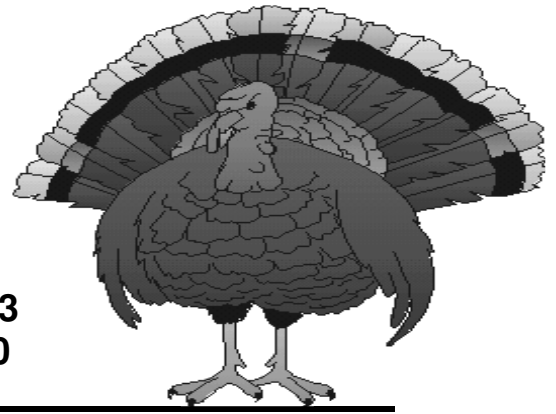

Parish Council

Speed limit: The public meeting in the Village Hall on 19th September determined that there was no need for a speed limit in the village, however it was agreed that advisory signs at the entry to the village could be beneficial. The ideas for location and style of these signs, are to be pursued at a site meeting with Mr Copeland of East Riding of Yorkshire Council.

Precept for 2001/2002: After reviewing the accounts and following discussion, this was set at £1,575.

Planning: Ebenezer House, Main Street – application for swimming pool and removal of trees; Mill House, Mill Hill – renewal of application for extension; P. Evison, Stonepit Road – new dwelling – refused; A. Shirley, Ings Lane – new dwelling – refused.

Bus shelter: To coincide with the school bus stop, the shelter is now to be situated on the north side of Howden Croft Hill. Service providers, who may have pipes or cables running beneath the shelter, have now given the site the



“all clear”. The next step is for Mr Thornham, the builder and East Riding of Yorkshire Council to meet on site and mark out the plot.

Footpaths: The track of the Cave Lane footpath has been dug and part filled with road scalplings, it is hoped that the remaining length will be filled and the whole length rolled by East Riding of Yorkshire Council Highways in the next few weeks.

Several people have remarked on the damage already being caused to the new surface by horses. This makes it difficult for walkers who have to negotiate deep hoof imprints. Perhaps riders could use the grass adjacent to the footpath?

Some shrubs are still being allowed by residents to grow over the tarmac footpath despite requests for their control. East Riding of Yorkshire Council is to be asked to pursue the offenders.

Sign for Trans-Pennine trail: A new sign on an unsightly pole has made an appearance at Hill Top. The Council has requested that it be transferred to an adjacent post and the new one removed.

Beck cleaning & tree trimming: A group, comprised mainly of members of the Council, spent most of one Saturday morning in November cleaning out a clogged section of the Beck and part of a Sunday morning in December helping to trim trees at Mill Hill corner which were overhanging the road.

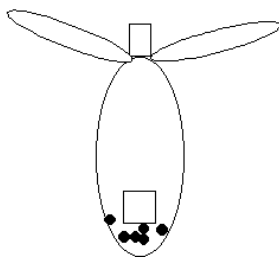


Millennium Committee

Bird feeder for Blue Tits

Now that we are finally into a cold weather period, small birds need a bit of extra carbohydrate to help them survive. This feeder will attract Blue Tits, Great Tits, Coal Tits and possibly Willow Tits. Most plump birds like House Sparrows, find it too difficult to balance on this feeder, so it leaves the food for birds which are more trim and agile. With the traditional peanut bag or cage, birds have to cling on to get their food through the mesh and it's the biggest, strongest or most aggressive which end with the most. With this one the birds take whole nuts and then disappear into a nearby tree to eat them in a more leisurely way, this leaves an opportunity for the smaller ones to get a turn at the scran.



- ◆ Take a 1½ or 2 litre plastic lemonade bottle
- ◆ Cut a 4cm square hole in the side about 4cm from the base
- ◆ Heat a metal skewer of knitting needle and make a series of holes at the lowest point in the base of the bottle (this is not essential but allows rainwater and condensation to drain away)
- ◆ Tie a thin piece of string or cord around the neck of the bottle, so that a loop of about 25cm long extends either side.
- ◆ Leave the cap on the bottle to keep out the rain and snow.
- ◆ Fill the base of the bottle with hulled peanuts to a depth of 4cm (i.e. level with the bottom

of the hole).

Suspend the feeder on a tree or pole using the loops to go around adjacent branches, twigs or sticks. It needs to be at least 1.5m from the ground and no closely overlooked by flat surfaces so that it is safe from cats. By using the loops instead of a single piece of string the feeder does not rotate and remains quite stable even in a fairly strong breeze. Put it up 2m to 3m from a window and see how different birds have various approaches to the readily available food. It is not unusual for example to see Coal Tits (white stripe on the back of a black head) to visit every 1-2 minutes. Clearly they are storing the nuts somewhere, to be eaten later – quite common behaviour when animals find an abundance of food.
