A site meeting was held on Brantingham Road with an ERYC Highways Department Officer and a representative YEDL. Promises were made of remedial work to be undertaken by both agencies, but as yet no substantive work has taken place. The chief problem concerns potential obstruction of the Beck by a 5 metre length of

power cable suspended low over the water.

Boundary footpath

Excavations by YEDL's contractors has lead to the footpath on



the Ellerker – South Cave Boundary, near Stonepit Road, becoming impassable and a new, unofficial route has been formed by footpath users. The original route has to be reinstated but so far no action has been taken by ERYC.

Streetscene

You may see yellow footpath and road markings where work is to due take place. This is a continuation of ERYC's 'Streetscene' activity and is a response to the questionnaire completed by the Parish Council.

Plinth

A quotation for repairs to the village name plinth on Cave Lane has been requested, the top two courses of bricks are eroding.

Ring Beck Cross Roads

ERYC were questioned about the bad habits by a few articulated vehicles at Ring Beck Crossroads. When these vehicles find that they are heading South on the wrong road they U-turn at this junction rather than using Stockbridge roundabout. This is a dangerous manoeuvre and damaging to the road surface, making it polished and consequently hazardous in wet weather. ERYC's response is that will monitor the situation once the A63 South Cave Interchange roundabout is complete.

Tree felling & lopping

A number of applications for tree felling and lopping have been made recently. Almost all applications have been approved. Residents are reminded that applications are necessary within the village conservation area and that they are free of charge. Forms are available from East Riding of Yorkshire Council. Failure to apply can lead to a fine of up to £2,000.

ring to the NPFA it was not unanimous, so the



change will not be taking place. This is due to a condition we had set at the beginning of our discussions that any change should have the undisputed backing of all members, before putting the pro-

posal to an open village meeting.

Village Hall (Refurbishment Update)

Previous editions of the 'Green 'Un' have reported on the angst associated with the seeking of funding for the above project, which, however much against the odds, culminated in the very gratefully received contributions particularly from Villagers, including generous offers of help 'in kind', from Lloyds TSB Charitable Trust and Waste Re-cycling Environmental Ltd ('WREN') which, through local councils, provides funding in relation to projects like ours from the landfill site taxes within our own geographical area.

The last few months have seen a marked advance in the project, which now only lacks the completion of the footpath around the Hall and re-roofing of the Ladies' and Gents' Toilets. Not only have all the windows been replaced along with much of the exterior woodwork, but a lot of work has been done towards the provision of emergency lighting, new emergency exiting and generous voluntary help in providing a new pathway and replacement of the oil tank. (Help still needed, though!)

But not forgetting, however, the complete redecoration of the interior of the hall and all adjoining rooms. A very willing band of Villagers and Committee members, armed with power tools and other (not-so-power) tools, sandpapers, paint brushes and cans and rollers, teapots, sugar, quiches, cakes and all other sorts of home-made confections - Toad would have had a Field day - descended on the Village hall for three full days with a great degree of enthusiasm and, despite the laughter and camaraderie. achieved exactly what we all set out to do. In addition to the volunteers from the Village, we were very pleased to welcome staff and inmates from HMP Wolds who contributed magnificently and very constructively to the entire project. All parties felt that the three days of work and banter had helped in producing a job well-done. Additionally, the inmates were able to enjoy some worthwhile work experience, we hope, and a chance to feel welcomed by the world to which they will shortly be returning. It is hoped that perhaps in the future, given sufficient publicity and forward thinking, similar projects can be arranged.

Sadly, all good things have to come to an end. The multi-choice of 'courses' at the mid-morning break, lunch-time and again at tea-time prompted in some of us a reluctance to return home to our regular one-choice diets! Thank you, everyone. (The Committee)
