

# The Future of Ellerker Playing Fields

You will have read in earlier issues of Ellerker News that the Committee has proposed that the essential running costs of the Playing Fields be funded



via the Parish Council Precept (Council Tax) – as happens in several other local Parishes.

The essential running costs are Mowing, Public Liability Insurance and Annual Inspection of the play equipment.

The Committee would still need to raise funds for things such as maintenance and replacement of the play equipment.

Thus far the Parish Council has turned down the proposal, they think that the precept increase would be unacceptable and that it would not have the backing of the majority in the Village.

If you feel strongly FOR or AGAINST the proposal to fund essential running costs of the Playing Fields from a £10 per year per

household Council Tax increase, please come to the AGM to be held in the Village Hall at 7.30pm on Wednesday, 13<sup>th</sup> April.

#### **Parish Council**

Tree Felling and Lopping – Should you need to fell or lop trees and live within the

Conservation Area then you need permission. Ask ERYC for a form to apply for this, since there are significant penalties for carrying out work without prior consent.



Mill Hill One Way System –This continues to be discussed at Council meetings, along with alternative ideas that could lead to greater safety at the sharp bend at the bottom of the hill.

It is felt that traffic volume is less of a problem now that the new roundabout has been completed.

Playing Fields — further discussion has taken place regarding the request from the Playing Field Committee for funding of essential running costs from the Parish Council Precept. Funds would still need to be raised by the Committee, for example to pay for the Children's Christmas Party, the replacement of equipment and non-essential maintenance. Some members of the Council are concerned that agreement to this proposal would lead to a large percentage rise in the precept and that there may not be a majority of residents in favour of the increase, which would amount to about £10 per household each year.

#### Rosalie and Ivor

Ivor Green, born in 1927, lived in Hilltop Cottage, Ellerker. His parents were Albert and Ellen (nee Pinder) Green. He left the village aged 5, when his father went to find work on Tyneside. He left school at 14 and went to sea.

I met Ivor in September 2003 when he visited the village with his younger friend Rosalie Meadows. They were walking around the edge of the Green looking at the view.

They both live in Tasmania and run a hotel called Holiday Lodge. The main purpose of Ivor's trip to Ellerker was to visit the graves of his parents and his auntie. Old Charles Pinder was Ivor's Uncle and Annie Pinder his Aunt.

Since that visit Holiday Lodge has been sold and the pair of them have set off on a sailing adventure in a boat called Elvira. This is a report from them in early November 2004:

4<sup>th</sup> November 2004

Rosalie And Ivor left Tasmania on Sat 30 October (as planned!) after settlement for Holiday Lodge on Friday.

But we did not leave at 10am as Ivor had promised, only 3 hours later at 1.30pm. Weather started out beautiful, with a great send-off from friends on Garden Island and Kelso. Into Bass Strait and the first few hours were lovely.

We tried putting sails up in the early evening, The furler went up easily, but the mainsail stuck and Ivor had to climb a little up the mast to free it from the lazy jacks - to my horror! Later that evening the wind strengthened and we thought it better to lower the sails - same problem again, and his nibs climbed out from the safety of the cockpit again while I tried not to panic. But he didn't fall overboard and I am trying to impress on him the importance of looking after my nerves and not putting me at risk of being a lone sailor, much to his amusement.

Sunday was still "rougher" than expected and

the breakfast on the big wave did not end up as porridge in our bowls - we reverted to corn flakes. Wind and currents were against us for much of the day and we seemed to make very slow progress, going by motor alone.

Late afternoon the seas seemed nicer and we tried the furler sail again for a few hours but took it down before nightfall. Next morning we could see Cape Otway but realised we would have another night at sea if we continued to Port Fairy as planned. We were rather tired, not being used to the short watches, so really needed a decent sleep. We pulled into Apollo Bay which is a lovely holiday spot, friendly people and good facilities.

That evening we had crayfish from the fisherman's co-op, fresh and good value. Next day was Melbourne cup day and wet so we stayed put. We left Apollo Bay yesterday morning and it was a slow trip against the 3 meter swell until we rounded Cape Otway. Then conditions improved and it was a pleasant afternoon but we could not reach Port Fiary by nightfall, so it was another night on the water, however this time it was much easier and calmer and we had to go slow so that we could enter the Port at high tide this morning. We tied up at 7 am.

Today is rainy. That's our trip so far
