

Parish Council

AGM on 17th May. At the AGM and Annual Village Assembly on Thursday 17th May 2007, Michael Harrison was returned as Chairman of the Parish Council. Maxine Moses took a seat as a new Councillor and Tim Pickles retired from the Council after 12 years service. We now need only one other Councillor to reach the number required by Ellerker PC.

New Speed Restrictions to 40mph. ERYC Highways Engineer, Mr. Hiscott, sent a letter, consulting on changes to the speed limits on the Roman Road, (old A63) from the cross roads at Ring Beck to the new roundabout at the A63 interchange, and beyond to Willow Flats. 40 mph is recommended due to the complexity of the interchange, increasing traffic flow and the amount of commercial premises on the south side of the A63. All Parish Councillors were in favour of the proposal.

Street Lighting. A contract has now been signed for the ERYC to take over the maintenance of the street lighting in the village.

Posts-Ings Lane. Four posts have been placed on the Ings Lane triangle to stop heavy vehicles running over the grass and



damaging the small hawthorn tree in the centre.

Cutting Back Trees. As a result of a meeting with the YEDL, a contractor has now cut back the trees in areas where there was a danger of contact with overhead electricity supply lines. This may well have caused earthing problems resulting in power cuts.

Scarecrow Committee. The Council has been offered some daffodil bulbs from the Scarecrow Festival Committee. These will be planted in time for Spring 2008.

Hedgerows. The Council wishes to remind landowners and tenants that under the provisions of The Hedgerows Act 1997, permission is required for the removal of Agricultural hedgerows. If advice is required contact Laura McCoy, Hedgerows and Nature Conservation Officer for ERYC, phone: 01482 393723.



Playing Fields—some history

The following account, written over 37 years ago, may be of interest to those who haven't lived for all that time in the village. It gives an impression of how times have changed in almost 4 decades.

MARCH 1970

TO THE PEOPLE WHO LIVE IN ELLERKER **PARISH**

This is the account to date concerning the village green and playing field.

During the 1939-45 War and afterwards, money was raised and given to a central emergency and memorial fund. A public meeting was called after the War ended and it was then decided to allot this money to various definite causes. At this same meeting a Village Playing Field Committee was formed and granted £180, with the job to seek and acquire a playing field for the village.

Many enquiries were made to find a suitable field but without success until 1963, when Mr Rutter of Ellerker Hall offered Apple-tree Close for sale. The Committee decide to buy this field and the lowest price that could be obtained was £500. The late Mr Percy May generously loaned the Committee £500 without interest to make the purchase. This money was repaid in full to Mrs May.

The Committee continued in its work by having the field levelled. Grass seed was donated and the field sown. Then the work of mowing and maintenance started. The raising of more money continued and generous donations, gifts, time and work were given by the people of the Parish to pay the costs and make the field successful.

During this time, legal work was started to make the ownership of the field a Trust, with a view to vesting the title deeds with the Charity Commissioners so that the ownership and purpose of the field would be secure and maintained without regards to named trustees.

In other words the field is held upon trust for a village green and recreation ground for the benefit of the people of Ellerker Parish in such a manner as the Committee of Management from time to time shall think fit.

The Trust deed states definite rules of how the Management Committee shall be elected and function. A copy of the deed is held by the Committee Secretary and may be seen by anyone, upon request.

In 1967, the small field next to the Black Horse was offered for sale by Mr G Baitson. The Committee decided to buy this field. The lowest price that could be obtained was £425. The money to buy this field was made up of cash in hand and mainly from personal loans, free of interest, by people in the village, including the Committee.

When the deeds of this field were secured, they were incorporated in the Trust Deed of Appletree Close and vested with the Charity Commissioners. All legal work is now completed and both fields are registered as recreation areas.

Most will agree that it shows what a community is capable of achieving when it 'pulls together'. But of course whether we like it or not the village has changed a lot since 1970. At that time it had a pub, a shop and a post office. There were more people living here whose occupation was associated with the village. Property was relatively cheap and it was possible for 1st time buyers to move in. It probably wasn't anticipated in 1970 that as well as providing a recreation area for local residents it would also make the village 'more desirable' – in estate agent parlance.

The Playing Field Committee recognise that the world has moved on, that the village is different now and to fund playing fields annual running costs a different approach is necessary. This was the reasoning behind the village survey which showed that the majority in the village wish to pay the running costs through their Council Tax via the Parish Precept. A survey in 1970 would no doubt have produced an entirely different result, because times and people's attitudes and incomes were different then.

Anyway, despite the wishes of the majority of the village to have the playing field's essential running costs collected in this way, the Parish Council regrettably, still feels unable to give this idea their support. This was once again made clear at the Parish Council AGM held on 17th May.
