Parish Council

The Parish Council met on the 13th October and 8th December 2016.

Councillor Damian Johns and Councillor George Ohikere, on behalf of the Parish Council, have secured funding for a Defibrillator for the village. The equipment will be installed at the Village Hall and further details of the training provided by the Yorkshire Ambulance Service to follow.

The Local Audit and Accountability Act 2014 (the Act) closes the Audit Commission and establishes new arrangements for the accountability and audit of local public bodies in England, including Parish Councils. The Act builds on the general principle that all local public bodies, regardless of size, must account for all the money they receive and spend, wherever it comes from. Local taxpayers expect local public bodies to be open and transparent about how they have handled public money, as these bodies are always accountable to the communities they serve.

Councillor Suwfiya Habergham and Clerk Alan Barker, on behalf of the Parish Council, have secured a grant from the Transparency Fund to purchase IT equipment, develop the Parish Council Website to enable the Council to function and communicate effectively and for

training for the Parish Councillors and Clerk.

Alan Barker has now completed 3 months in his role as Clerk to the Parish Council. Alan is a regular visitor to the village, attending meetings and updating the village notice boards. Alan can be contacted via the Ellerker Parish website or by email:

The Council is inviting some expert advice for the management of the fruit trees on the allotment. Although there was a good crop of fruit on some of the trees, others have some disease and need pruning or replacing. The necessary work will be done before the spring.

Steps are being taken to remove the redundant telephone box in the village before it falls into further disrepair.

The ERYC Street Scene workers have been reminded that the only places that weed killer is allowed in the village are against the kerbstones and around the external wall of The Croft.

Following four accidents recently on the stretch of road between Sewell's petrol filling station and the Brough Stockbridge roundabout, a letter requesting a 40mph speed limit and improved road signage and markings at the Ring Beck crossroads has been sent to the ERYC. Following their investigations, a response is expected in January.

Councillors considered the proposals in the East Riding for changes to Urgent Care and voted to support Option 1, which is to create 2 Urgent Care Centres at Beverley and Goole. In the proposal for wrap-around care Councillors voted for Option A, which is the creation of an integrated community and rehabilitation centre in a single location at Beverley, supported by *Time to Think* beds. The consultation runs until 17th January and residents can make their own views known on the ERYC website.

Following the resignation of Ruth Haycock, the Parish Council now has one vacancy, which it aims to fill before the next meeting on 2nd February. If any resident is interested in joining the Council, please contact the Clerk or any of the Parish Councillors.

Residents are again respectfully requested not to park on the grass verges, which are getting badly churned up in certain parts of the village.

Brick People

Inside the Village Hall hangs a framed photograph of the opening of the Hall in 1929. Lord Deramore, the Lord Lieutenant at the time, is pictured ceremonially turning the key, flanked by Major & Mrs Field Till of Ellerker Hall, with Sir Arthur Atkinson between them.

On a closer look at this photograph it is interesting to see half of the inscribed bricks in their original exterior position. The late Mrs Edith Wood, of Hazel House used to say she raised money towards the building of the Hall by 'selling' inscribed bricks for half a crown (12½p) each.

When cloakrooms were eventually built, the commemorative bricks changed from being external and open to the weather, to internal and protected for posterity. There is a central brick inscribed AD 1929 and among the names of people which surround it are:

HAROLD WALTON and his brother LAURENCE WALTON who lived at Chapel House.

W. C. HYDE haulier and smallholder.

R. G. COULTOUS who lived at Oxmardine, opposite the church bell-cote. [Now Appleton House – Ed.]

WILLIAM REED of Church Lane.

A. BORMAN father of Emma, Gladys and Laura. Laura was housekeeper for Mrs Ellerker of Howdencroft.

FRANCIS E. BARRATT (Frank) of Micawber Cottage, potato merchant, church warden and WWII soldier.

KATHLEEN NEEDLER (Kay Barratt). Frank's late wife, who was two years old when these bricks were laid. She lived all her eighty-nine years in Ellerker and worked loyally for local blind people.

CHARLIE WOOD of Ashley House, who founded the present haulage business.

R. HORNSEY, Taylor of South Cave.

SOUTH CAVE SILVER BAND who played at local events and were

remembered for accompanying the carol singers who visited outlying farms, local streets and had many a good supper there.

Some names are un-remembered as their bricks mention Doncaster, Wetherby, London, Middlesbrough and Colwyn Bay, even Canada. They must all have had good memories of Ellerker.
