

## **Parish Council**

The Parish Council met on 11th May 2017 for the Annual Council Meeting.

The Parish Council and internal audit approved the annual accounts for the 12 months to 31st March 2017. The dates set for the period of exercise of public rights commences on 5th June 2017 and ends on 14th July 2017.

During this period the <u>Annual Governance Statement and Accounting Statements for 2016/17</u> are available to view on the Parish noticeboards and the website.

Work has been completed on the allotment hedges, with three new fruit trees planted in the community orchard. On the advice of the ERYC Trees Officer. further work will be completed to remove the 10 diseased Poplar trees, thus allowing the remaining Alder trees to flourish. The Allotment Working Group has provided a report with regards to potential restrictions on tenancy of the allotments. Extensive research has been completed into the legalities confirming there are no covenants limiting the allotments use to Ellerker residents. The 2017/18 tenancy contracts will be updated. The Working Group will be formulating a plan of action as to how the management of the allotments should be progressed. Please contact the Clerk via the contact form on the website if vou are interested in becoming an allotment tenant. A further leaflet drop advertising the allotment will be undertaken in due course to all residents of Ellerker.

The Parish Council and the Neighbourhood Watch Committee have worked together to update the Ellerker Village Emergency Plan. An Emergency box is stored at the Village Hall. Details have been published on the Ellerker Parish website and further information will be made available in the Village Hall.

Further updates have been made to the Ellerker Parish website to support the requirements of the Transparency Code. Additional policy and procedural documents have been approved by the Parish Council and added to the website.

Funding has been requested for 2017/18 from the Transparency Fund to

support the ongoing development of the Parish Website.

Several projects have been identified and submitted to the Parish Council to improve the ambience of the village, including reducing the erosion of the verges at various points in the village, as many residents continue to express concern.

The Parish Council continue to seek

evidence of incidents on the road between Sewell's Garage and the Elloughton roundabout to influence ERYC and the police to reduce the speed limit. Warning signs have been installed with regards to cyclists crossing by ERYC. The Council is continuing to pursue options to slow traffic approaching the crossroads at Ringbeck and Brantingham Road.

The Parish Council continue to work with Yorkshire Water with regards to the overflow of effluent from the Ellerker Water Treatment Works. ERYC Highways have been requested to manage recurrent and excessive pooling of surface water at various sites around Ellerker, at times of moderate rainfall due to the silted drains.

Information with regards to planning applications submitted to the Parish Council for comment can be found on the ERYC planning portal or in the Parish Council meetings minutes.

**Hazel House**. Lombardy Poplar x2: fell as are growing over the highway. EPC Approved. ERYC pending.

**Ashley House**. Erection of single storey extension to rear. EPC Approved. ERYC pending.

**Westholme**, Ings Lane. Leylandii x11: fell to re-landscape and replant. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

**Elmsall House.** Sycamore x3: fell due to overcrowding, Sycamore: rebalance crown. Approved by EPC.17 ERYC approved.

Laggy Cottage, Church Lane. Erection of two storey and first floor extension and dormer extension to rear follow-

**SunnyDene** / Bramblewood. Change of use from Bramblewood nurseries to caravan storage. EPC Objected. ERYC pending

Howden Croft. T1 Laburnum; fell, T2 Cypress; fell, T3 Leyland Cypress: fell, T4 Ornamental Thorn: fell, Weeping willow: fell, T6 Norway Maple: remove low limb at 2m on south side, T7 Oak: fell, T8 Norway Maple: remove 5 small low branches to south side of trunk. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

**Garth Farm**, Sands Lane. Partially demolish existing lean-too canopy. EPC Approved. ERYC approved.

Howden Croft Hill, Parish Allotment. Poplar x10: fell due to disease. ERYC approved 19.04.17

Orchard House, Sands Lane. Conifer to be reduced in height to around 10 - 12 feet (3-4m) maximum due to excessive shading of vegetable plot. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

**Ebenezer House**. Holly x2; reduce in height to 8ft (2.5m) to reinstate as hedge. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

Ings House. T1 - T5, 5 large poplar trees, bottom of garden, to be removed to ground level, D1 dead tree in same hedgerow, remove to ground level. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

Ebenezer House. Alterations to reinstate Forsythia Cottage as a separate dwelling from Ebenezer House to include erection of single storey extension at rear, porch canopy at front and construction of new vehicular access. Revised scheme. Approved. ERYC approved.

Land SE of CMW Horticulture Ltd. Change of use of land to form caravan storage area and associated access. Approved by EPC. ERYC approved.

Little Garth Howden Croft Hill. Erection of extensions to front and rear and alterations to roof height and shape to create additional living accommodation at first floor level. Re-submission. EPC Objection. ERYC approved.

Appeal Decision to note:

Land East of Little Wold Lane (Residential development for up to 82 dwellings) - Confirmed 15.03.17 that the appeal has been upheld.

## **Church House**

Mary Dennis kindly loaned me ancient copies of The Howdenshire Church Magazine which explains how Church House on Howdencroft Hill came to be built. Here is an extract from an issue of the magazine in 1911. It's interesting to note how the language and sentiment differs from an appeal we might expect to read nowadays:

"This month we wish to draw attention to a matter of importance. On Thursday, 20th July, a small meeting,

consisting of the Clergy and Church- 2nd July, 1911. wardens of both parishes and one or two others, was held at the Vicarage to consider a scheme for building a Curate's residence at Ellerker. The need has been long felt, and the efficiency of the work long hampered, for want of a suitable house in that part of the parish. The opportunity of buying a suitable site has presented itself, and it was felt that, the time had come when the some step forward ought to be taken. The meeting constituted itself into a Committee (with power to add) to promote the scheme and to solicit subscriptions and help from parishioners and friends. The help of all, small and great, will be needed in carrying out the work, and is earnestly solicited; and it is hoped

"I most cordially commend the proposal to build a house for the Curate of the parish of Brantingham who is in charge of the district of Ellerker. I am satisfied that it is almost impossible to secure the benefit of a resident clergyman unless some provision is made for a residence; and I trust that the effort to build a suitable house will be widely and generously supported. " Cosmo Ebor." [This was the signature of the Archbishop of York, Cosmo Gordon Lang, who later became Archbishop

of Canterbury - Ed.] The above words will speak for themselves, and we trust will waken a ready
