## **Parish Council**

- The Editor There was a good turn-out for the The Parish Council met on 9th November for the Bi Monthly Council Meetings. The Parish Council also facilitated a Public Meeting on the same evening.

> The Parish Council has installed a Christmas Tree, generously donated by Ellerker Lodge, on the village playing field. The lights were switched on at 6pm on the 9th December following the traditional village children's Christmas Party.

> The Parish Council hosted the Neighbourhood Watch Quiz on Friday, 27th October 2017 with 11 teams participating. The Neighbourhood Watch Shield was awarded to Martin Scott's winning team

> The Parish Council requested feedback from Ellerker residents and businesses for consideration at the November Parish Council Meeting with regards to suggestions for projects to improve the ambience of the village in the short and medium Please can any further comterm. ments be submitted to the clerk via the contact form available on the Ellerker Parish website or directly to any Parish Councillor.

Humber Nature Partnership would like to engage with Parish Councils and would be happy to provide a presentation on their work and explore the ways they might work together with local communities bordering the Humber Estuary. Further information has been requested with regards to this project.

The Parish Council continues to raise concerns of local residents and the Neighbourhood Watch Committee with East Riding of Yorkshire Council (ERYC) Traffic and Parking Team with regards to speed limits in the vicinity of the village. A further response was received in October 2017 confirming EYRC are happy to undertake a survey for the Parish Council but as the road between Sewell's Garage and the Elloughton roundabout is not considered busy there would have to be a large number of vehicles exceeding 68mph. In terms of traffic calming measures these are reserved for those roads where there has been a significant collision history and where casualties can be reduced. When assessing for such measures caution is exercised to ensure that the limited funding ERYC receives gets spent on those areas where there is evidence/history and pattern of collisions. The ERYC does sympathise with residents' concerns however they cannot react to sites where there is fear or expectation of a collision.

The Allotment Working Group is progressing the development of a wildflower meadow for part of the Stonepits Field Allotment Gardens. The Working Group is following a plan of action as to how the management of the allotments will be progressed, working with the current tenants. Please contact the Clerk via the contact form on the website if you are interested in becoming an allotment tenant.

The Ellerker Parish website continues to be updated to support the requirements of the Transparency Code along with the training and development of the Parish Council team.

The Parish Council continue to seek support from Yorkshire Water and ERYC Highways with regards to the overflow of effluent from the Ellerker Water Treatment Works and the management of recurrent and excessive pooling of surface water at various sites around Ellerker at times of moderate rainfall due to the silted drains.

The Ellerker Parish website allows local businesses to promote their business and sponsor the website at a cost of £10 per year. The new sponsorship year commenced on 1st October 2017. The Parish Council would like to thank the existing sponsors for their support and offer the opportunity for further businesses to become a sponsor - <u>see here</u>.

Following the submission of planning application 17/03051/PLF on 26.10.17 in respect of the change of use of land from a Nurseries Processing Business to a Semi **Retirement/Retirement** Static Caravan Park on the Westland Nurseries site the decision was taken by the Parish Council to facilitate a Public Meeting prior to submitting comments to the ERYC Planning Officer in response to the level of concern expressed with regards to this application by members of the public and Parish Councillors. The Parish Council subsequently submitted a detailed objection to this planning application on the 14th November 2017.

# Paddy Hall on Thought For The Day

day, 15<sup>th</sup> December.

#### "Good morning.

Recently an 18-year-old girl reported, of her internet habit, "I am not sure I am ready to meet my friend in real life- what would I say to her?"

Yesterday we held the Christmas party for children of the village, and a few who have moved nearby. We mustered 15. Many of the houses in the village are now too expensive for young families. When

my children went to the parties there were 30 or so of them. This 15



made decorations around tables, played pin the tail on the donkey, musical chairs, statues and other traditional wild games through exhaustion and on again. They ate and drank homemade party food that appeared from everywhere, met Father Christmas who amazingly knew them all by name and had a present for each of them.

The parents and grandparents all stood around with mulled wine and mince pies, admired each other's new babies and caught up. Father Christmas pulled a child's name from his hat, and she, at 6.30 in the freezing dark when most of the rest of the village had arrived, went outside, counted down from 10 and lit up a huge tree on the green, donated by the garden centre.

A choir and song sheets appeared, and carols were sung by torchlight, and by four generations, largely in tune, and surprisingly movingly, until it was too cold, and the remains of the mulled wine called from inside.

Parents shared memories of previous village parties to real friends they had made at the time and stuck with over the years. Children were tired, chatting to each other and starting to store their own treasures away. I think our 15 don't yet know how lucky they are. They will do.
